Who is Jesus

When we say Jesus is God, we are saying that He created everything. He not only created it, but He holds it together. Weather patterns and tectonic plates and human emotions were invented by Him. They are subject to His authority. Nothing happens unless He gives the okay.

4. Is there anything in those verses that you've never thought of before, or causes you to think differently?

5. Can you pick apart this passage and make an argument that Jesus was/is NOT God, based on what He isn't and what He doesn't do?

Colossians 1:29-2:5

1. How many times does Paul say “I” or “my” or some other me-focused word in these verses?

2. What is Paul’s role in making the gospel known?

3. Is it easy for him? What are some of his struggles?

4. To what degree do you find it hard to share the gospel? What are some of your obstacles?

Colossians 2:6-15

1. Restate in your own words, what is Paul getting at here.

2. Verse 6 says we should "continue to live" for Christ. What does that mean to you?

3. What do the Christian life and plants have in common?

4. What is the "written code" mentioned in verse 14 and what happened to it?

5. How should what Christ did (verse 13-15) influence our ability to "continue to live in Him"?

Colossians 2:16-23

1. Can you see any of these such things in this passage?

2. Whether it's a New Moon festival or the worship of angels, how do the things Paul lists here affect our salvation?

3. According to verse 22, what will happen to these things? Why will such things perish?

4. Why do you think these things lack value in the Christian life, like Paul says in verse 23?

5. Are there similar teachings out there today? How can we distinguish between heresy and truth?

- Determine what obstacles are in your way to growing closer to Christ and remove them.
