4. What will happen to evil men at this time?

2 Thessalonians 2:1-12

1. What does Paul ask of the Thessalonian believers early in this passage?

2. Do you think that this must've been going on?

3. Verse 8 tells us what will happen to the man of lawlessness. What is it?

4. How could you be a more disciplined person in your speech, attention, work, etc.?
